


4. We discussed the aperture problem for pattern translation, but also 'aperture problems' in general.

8. An echolocating bat emits high frequency calls that are reflected off of objects in the environment and analyzed by its auditory system.
(a) Primates use <i>eye movements</i> to place the fovea, which has a greater <i>concentration</i> of receptors than the retinal periphery, over interesting targets. Bats, by analogy, are said to have an 'acoustic fovea'. What <i>bat behavior</i> inspired this analogy?
